Notes from the Jungle

"The Jungle" is the migrant camp in Calais. These are the words of 3 volunteers who took a week of their holiday entitlement from work to help out in one of the charity organisations there in early April this year. None of them has any formal religion or attends any church.

"Care4Calais was established by a certain Clare Moseley who had read an online article about the Jungle and decided to personally deliver some donations. That was August 2015 and she's still there. The camp is **not** supported by the UN or any of the larger **NGOs** so it exists on the charity and help offered by such donors and volunteers – mostly from France, Germany, England and Ireland.

The Jungle has existed on UK's doorstep since 1999. The population was in excess of 4,500 (mostly from Syria, Iraq and Afghanistan – but also other war-torn countries like Sudan and Eritrea). A large part of the camp has recently been demolished and 3,000 of its inhabitants evicted. The number is expected to rise again as the weather improves.

Who lives there? Some women and children but mostly young men – probably because they are thought to have the best chance of completing the journey.

Their shelters? Constructed from pallets and canvas – little by way of sanitation and running water.

Why don't they claim asylum in France? Because many already have English and feel further daunted by the challenge to learn another language. Some also have relatives and friends already in UK. Apart from the danger of rubber bullets and tear gas from French police, there were 25 documented deaths in 2015 of people being hit by trucks and trains, beaten by lorry drivers or drowning while swimming out to ferries.

What did we do? Help sort the many car-loads of clothing and other essentials which arrive every day at Care4Calais depot. We went to the camp to distribute food and clothes, gave some English lessons and helped some of the refugees to improve their make-shift shelters.

What did it do for us? We left reluctantly and with mixed feelings. Camp conditions have improved, thanks to organisations like Care4Calais. The daily car and van arrivals with donations mean that people are concerned for these migrants' lives and well-being. There is also some joy in the camp itself. A huge game of football was being organised the day we left. But there is also something entirely unjust, that by a pure accident of birth, we can board a train back home while thousands, who have endured unimaginable suffering before and during their long, perilous migration, must survive in unsanitary camps in countries they hoped would come to their assistance.

Reflection on Sunday's Readings

We prepare ...

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Ascension. This marks the final part of Jesus ministry here on earth, and the beginning of a new time - a time of the Spirit.

In the old Testament we see that the Spirit of God is given to particular people (like Samson), for a particular purpose at a particular time. In Jesus, people encountered the Spirit of God incarnated in humanity. Now Gods generosity was to explode and Gods Spirit was to be poured out on all people who accepted it! However, there needed to be some preparation before that. Jesus offered the apostles a clear challenge to go out to the whole world, but first they would return to the upper room to ponder and pray about the way ahead.

As a diocese we have been involved in amazing times these past weeks. Our diocesan synod was a real experience of Gods people discerning the voice of God for us, at this particular time and place. This Easter Season has become a true time of reflecting and learning what this encounter means for our lives. While we may be tempted to rush into action, and to respond to the clear challenge to 'go out' ... we too need to take some time in prayer and discernment, in order to be ready for the next steps.

Let us take time re-reading and remembering Synod2016, in order to learn how we are being called. Let us share the stories, listening for how we personally have been blessed, challenged and inspired. Before action, let us acknowledge the call and await the Spirit.
