African Visit

Recently I had the opportunity to spend some weeks as a guest of our Nigerian colleagues. It was for me a steep learning curve. In the coming weeks I hope to print in our newsletter a few thoughts and reflections which have arisen from my visit.

A major part of the pastoral ministry of the Irish Augustinian Province has been in the field of the foreign missions. Indeed our foundations in Britain, America, and Australia have largely been the fruit of the efforts of Irish Augustinians. In the 1930s the Irish Province accepted an offer to open a mission in Nigeria. It was a daunting challenge. The territory involved was remote and geographically larger than all of Ireland.

By 1970 some sixty Irish missionaries were operating in Nigeria. The whole enterprise had been a resounding success. New diocese had been established, schools seminaries and hospitals had been set up. All of this presented great logistical challenges and it must be said the members of the province rose to the occasion. In all of this they were supported by dedicated teams of volunteers. Obviously great financial and material sacrifices were called for.

One vital aspect of the Augustinian project in Nigeria was the fostering of local vocations. It was providential that this vital initiative was undertaken. If in 1970

sixty Irish Augustinians were working in Nigeria it is a very different picture today. The number has been reduced to four and none of them are in the first flush of youth. Nevertheless Nigeria is a flourishing Augustinian province. It has now over one hundred members with many more in formation. It buzzes with youth and enthusiasm. New parishes and foundations are opening up and the future is so promising. And all this at a time when the "mother" Irish province appears to be on the verge of extinction. It is certainly an uplifting and encouraging experience to visit and to witness the life vivacity and optimism of a young and growing church.




Fr. Michael Walsh OSA

Fr. Ted Visits Limerick



During the week we had a visit from Fr. Ted Mc Carthy O.S.A. (Pictured here with Bro Michael Danaher) on a short break from the Augustinian Mission in Ecuador.

A few of us sat with him after Mass one morning as he related stories and the magnitude of damage done by the Earthquake they had there recently. He continues 'shortly after the earthquake he met with many

people who had gathered on the park outside the church they were crying and embracing each other through all their sorrow and grief. Then one person began reciting the Divine Mercy and everyone joined in and afterwards went into the church where Fr. Ted said Mass. They began to sing and lift their hearts however the tremors were not over as they soon realised. With electricity gone they managed to gather some candles as darkness fell around 7.30pm.

The following day the devastation was great the local state hospital was demolished however the Hospital of St. Rita was still standing and dealing with the many injured'. Coming back to Ireland he continues 'its good to be home, the cars are getting bigger but the Irish hearts are still warm and beautiful'... Fr. Ted wants to express his **sincere gratitude** to all of you who supported the appeal on Sunday 19th the final total coming to €3,000. He will be returning shortly to Ecuador bringing with him the generosity and love of the Irish people.
