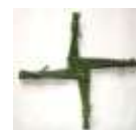
Prayer to St. Brigid

Thursday 1st February: Feast of St. Brigid

Next Thursday, 1st February is the Feast of St. Brigid, secondary patron of Ireland and woman of compassion. She is remembered for her hospitality, her generosity to the poor and her care for the sick. Stories from our school books celebrated these qualities. Her name is linked with the town of Kildare, the site of a large monastery founded by St. Brigid.

In our own time, the spirit and spirituality of the saint is enfolded in the Brigidine Sisters, a congregation of nuns founded by Bishop Daniel Delany, Bishop of Kildare and Leighlin in 1807 in Tullow, Co. Carlow. In 1992 they returned to Kildare to restore the site of the old monastery to establish a spirituality centre, and re-ignite the fire of St. Brigid.
