

ST. PATRICK'S BREASTPLATE

Profile of St. Patrick: He was born, about 410, probably in Cumbria, northern England, close to the Scottish border. Kidnapped as a young boy, he was shipped to Ireland as a slave and put shepherding sheep in mountains of Co. Down. He himself tells us in his brief story, Confessions, how he spent many nights in prayer. After six years as a shepherd he had a dream in which he was commanded to escape and return home. This he succeeded in doing. He then spent several years studying in various monasteries throughout Europe. He was ordained a priest and bishop and sent by Pope Celestine to evangelize Ireland. For 33 years he traversed the country and it seems barely a county does not have some memorial to St. Patrick. The saint died 491.

The Person of Christ was at the heart of Patrick's preaching and his personal spirituality. How powerfully this is portrayed in his prayer, known as his Breastplate. Dare we long, especially this weekend, to be filled with the Person of Christ as Patrick was. Let us resolve to say this little prayer regularly in honour of St. Patrick.

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me, Christ before me, Christ beside me, Christ to win me, Christ to comfort and restore me, Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet, Christ in danger Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger. I bind unto myself the name, the strong name of the Trinity: By invocation of the same, the Three in One and One in Three: Of whom all nature hath creation, eternal Father, Spirit, Word: Praise to the Lord of my salvation, Salvation is of Christ the Lord.



St. Patrick's Festival 2019




