First Sunday of Advent

Advent is about beginnings – we begin the church's liturgical year; we begin our preparation together for Christmas; and we begin a time of special reflection which we will share during these four weeks. Also, as we will be hearing constantly throughout these four weeks, Advent is also about completions. We will arrive at the celebration of the birth of Jesus; our preparations will come to an end and we will rejoice in his coming; and, as Advent will remind us many times, we will move another bit closer to the end of our own time on earth, and, indeed, the end of time itself.

While the Church's year goes in a circle – it begins, like clockwork, every year, with the First Sunday of Advent - our lives do not. We do not relive the same events each year as if we were in some sort of eternal Groundhog Day. Even though, while we are doing our Christmas shopping, we might well feel that we are going around in circles, in fact, we are not – all of the seemingly separate things that we do will lead us towards our goal. And Advent reminds us that whatever it is we are working towards, it is only another step on the journey to

another goal – our definitive encounter with the God who loves us when we will have reached the end of our lives on earth. Each one of us will die and our world will eventually end. Advent puts this reality firmly before our eyes. The message of Advent is that time is passing. As time passes, we often don't notice it.

Advent gives us a different perspective – to use our time as well as we can; to not waste our time by allowing ourselves to become distracted by what does not really matter. And, if we have somehow gotten stuck, Advent encourages us to begin again; constantly begin again; to never feel that we have completed our task of living out our baptismal calling so that when the Lord either calls us, or comes to claim us, we will be ready.

Last Sunday Nov.21st Feast of the Presentation of Our Lady in the Temple, Presentation Schools remembered and celebrated Nano Nagle Foundress of the Presentation Sisters. Nano gave her life and fortune to provide Education for all and for Nano Education was the key.

This year in Colaiste Nano Nagle, Sexton Street we remembered six young Presentation Sisters and a postulant who left Limerick in 1873 for the ends of the earth never to return home.

They left their convent in Sexton Street and set up several schools and an excellent system of Education in Victoria Australia. They had a long boat journey 58 days but they kept their high spirits and left their mark with Nano's spirit urging them on. These girls lit Nano's lantern and kept it burning bright.
