# 2nd Sunday of Advent

## A Rough Way

John the Baptist wore the camel-hair coat but never became an icon of the catwalk. Instead of following his lead the fashion establishment demanded and got his head on a plate. They didn't even bother casting lots for his robe. Just held their noses and buried it with him. It was, no doubt, a garment without frills; mottled, rough, neither furry nor fragrant

But fashion wouldn't be fashion if it didn't change and change again. A few years back Ralph Lauren put camel-hair coats on sale, price \$4,900 each, and what do you think happened? Ralph's army of acolytes couldn't skin or shave camels fast enough to meet the demand. The sold-out signs went up in Milan, New York, Paris.

Judging by today's gospel, John, the great voice of Advent, would have less in common with



designers of haute couture than with desert nomads. We know a place where their lifestyle might differ little from John's. Likewise the dangers listed elsewhere by Isaiah are to them present dangers. Locusts, if too many, are as a biblical plague; billions of them swarming, blotting out the sun and stripping the land of all that is good. If manageably few, these locusts make a good meal. Wild honey is a treat, obtained with the help of smoke from wren-like nests suspended in the dry vegetation. Cobras and vipers are there and as soon as seen are dealt summary justice by a people reared on the wisdom "strike before you're struck." Lions aren't there any more but strong-jawed and stronger-smelling hyenas are good substitutes. They howl by night, lost souls sending out some message we don't get as they advance towards their next meal. To fend them off the sheep and goats are corralled behind stockades of thorn cactus and desert scrub guarded by machete-wielding men who could not be called

squeamish. Wolves too are rare now but their work among lambs is carried on with no less enthusiasm by a variety of wild dogs.

With John, what we call celebrity went the same way as fashion. Many things are built around a person, or an image of a person that has been impressed upon us. A message is attached and the messenger is glorified. And the same messengers are reluctant to walk away from microphone or camera long after the applause has petered out. If anyone ever resisted temptation to cash in on the cult of personality, John the Baptist did. He handed in his resignation with unmistakable clarity when the time came. The one who follows me is more powerful than I am. And I am not fit to carry his sandals. We all have our place and John knew his

When dealing with the men of influence John didn't soften his robust style of diplomacy; Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming. He was still roaring repentance as the nest of snakes slithered from the burning grass.

At all times in all places there have been a glimpses of Isaiah's Ideal land with innocence in charge and erstwhile enemies living, eating and resting together. But, it's a big but, another vision looms over us. Our world is pockmarked by irruptions of war, famine, narcissistic power and cruelty.

Smaller concerns irk the lives of many who are blessedly distant from the theatres of greater horror. Meanwhile many things prevent our own church giving the comfort it once might do. We're well ready for Advent.
