Which Way?

You'd think Jeremiah was playing up to his gloomy image when he said "A curse on the man who puts his trust in man." Still, some unfortunates would say he hit the nail on the head. For example, the three tourists wanting to see the Ahmed Awa waterfall. Trying to follow the well-meant directions of locals they strayed into Iran and disappeared. Long afterwards we read of them "Sarah was let go 14 months later on "humanitarian grounds." Fattal and Bauer were convicted of "illegal entry" 2 years later and sentenced to 8 years in prison.

We're lucky to live in a little country bounded by water, unlikely to suffer as they did for going astray. That's unless our new border turns out harder than the hardest hankered after by the most brazen Brexiteer.

But finding our way on our own little bit of land poses its own challenges. When we're not sure which way to go the sign-post is welcome indeed. Follow its direction and you can't go wrong. That's unless some local wit has exercised his comic genius by turning the sign around sending us away from our intended end. In places where the culture has not developed in this way the signpost is unmolested and sends us the right growing until a T-junction without of any sign, right, left or wrong, plunges us back into the land of the lost.

Many city and town councils think signposts look bare and unbeautiful, so they plant trees in front of them or shrubs which soon produce beautiful fronds to enfold them. If we want to access the information here we part the foliage and climb the post to read its sign. Off-times we have to revert to the oldest method and ask the way. People are willing to help but this is not as simple as it used to be.

Many of today's pedestrians in our cities are new arrivals

and so unable to pilot us to harbour. Meet one born around the place, familiar with the locality, and your directions—even if you understand them - are rounded off with the dreaded "you can't miss it". This after you've spent the last 30 minutes missing it. Today they'll tell you the Sat-Nav is your only man. But isn't that a bit un-human, mechanical? Might as well get into a parcel and be posted.

When Thomas said "How can we know the way?" Jesus didn't give him a route plotted by Sat-Nav.

Accepting "I am the Way..." still involves a good bit of signpost reading and an odd visit to a cul-de-sac. It takes in much travel with vehicles showing signs of dirt in the petrol and some night-driving when the lights are not great. It often requires dealing with some who seem to be going in the opposite direction and sometimes a sneaking fear that they might be right. Above all it demands a good bit of going back to ask the Way and look at the one who claimed to be it., how he travelled and rested, fasted and feasted; how he dealt with the big and the small, the right and the wrong. And did he say "You can't miss it".
