The rewards Jesus speaks of in today's gospel do not come quick and clear. If virtue is its own reward, it has to be because often enough it seems to get no other. It's easy to find examples.

A man I knew drank in the same pub for most of our lifetime. Each night he invited himself to travel home in the car of someone more sober than himself - that gave him a wide choice. One of his habitual drivers told me it was always easier to get him into the car than to get him out. The grog worked its wicked will *in via* and journey's end saw him, well, quite groggy. Disembarking was not a voluntary operation. By now his limbs were arranged in the manner of a catatonic octopus and shifting him was, as we now say, challenging.

On arrival at the imbiber's home, where his long-suffering mother waited by a dying fire, extra help was sometimes needed for the unloading. To this end one such night our driver noisily roused a young neighbour from sleep. This latter good samaritan had his charitable impulses complicated by a recently-wed wife who as yet was only imperfectly acquainted with the local customs. Thought for the Day


