# Whip Hand in Father's House

We approach Cheltenham, high point of the year for horses that run and jump and sometimes fall. So, we can expect debate on use of the whip. To help the medicine go down with the TV viewers, commentators will sanitise the whipping saying such things as the jockey *is asking his horse for an effort,* or is *getting after him* or *reminding* him of his job or, best of all, has drawn the persuader. Animal-lovers will cry "cruelty" and horse-lovers will reply with the noble sentiment that the whip is an aid to equine excellence. One will see it as callous violence against a beautiful animal while to another it will be nothing more than motivation for pampered racehorses to be, in the current trite expression, the best version of themselves.

Jesus "drew the persuader" in today's gospel, not to educate a reluctant nag but in disgust at misuse of his Father's house.

Like many an institution the Temple had become entrapped by its riches and muddled in its purpose.

A building of shining white marble and gold, with bronze entrance doors, it was said that you could not look at the Temple in daylight as it would blind you. The attention to detail in its construction is exemplified by the placing of gold spikes on the roof line of the building to prevent birds sitting on the Temple and soiling it. And, perhaps worse, the imperative of sacrificing animals on the big feast-days had turned it into a shambles in its original meaning, a place of carnage. Visible splendour mixed with stinking horror.

Talk of trade in the Temple reminds me of a place where our own churches saw services and rituals not found in directives from The Congregation for the Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments. There were times when a parish church where we were stationed did look like a marketplace—at Harvest Thanksgiving Mass. The place shook with music and exuberance. You had hours-long Offertory processions. People of all kinds and stations danced to the altar with everything from live goats to small guinea fowl eggs proudly carried by a small child for presentation. A few rams, trussed hens and a haltered bull were persuaded to go forward unimpeded by rules against excessive use of the whip. Ghetto-blasting music-machines and toilet bowls held high by young men-like Declan Hannon (every year?) with the Liam McCarthy Cup in the Hogan Stand — stood out in the joyful parade. A hundred other items went up the same aisle to be sold in an afternoon auction to the relatively rich. These loudly and proudly demonstrated both their wealth and their support for the church by paying high prices. A bottle of beer, a cooked chicken and unrestrained flattery were the big donors' reward. It was all part of the life of our Temple.

I think the trade of Harvest Thanksgiving Day would escape the whip of Jesus because the motive was not exploitation or private profit but to build up a house of God. And to celebrate in high joy while doing so. This house was built of many bricks, a number of whom were very proud to be rich and a much greater number equally unashamed to be poor. J.L.


