### **Abraham Adamu Moses and Me**

Today sees the *Third Scrutiny* in the Catechumenal preparation of adults for Easter Baptism: A Scrutiny by *God revealing what is valuable in each along with the ways they are hurting, sick or sinful ..... not to reject but to call to new life and healing.* The prayer says *Free these elect from the death-dealing power of the spirit of evil.* A prescribed reading comes from the Book of Numbers. It tells of the plague of fiery serpents that met Moses and his cranky crew in the desert after they left Egypt. And how Moses used the divinely-prescribed antidote, a bronze snake on a pole, to save them. This, though its history is a bit tricky, became a logo of the healing professions. Our national patron's feast is a good day to remark that Irish lore would have Patrick there beside Moses as conquerer of serpents.

Just like Moses, I have my own snake-on-a-stick story. I made close acquaintance with one of their kind on the night Ronald Reagan beat Jimmy Carter in the US Presidential election. I was alone in the mission house. I took the radio with me on a visit to the bathroom to continue hearing the election count on Voice of America. I noticed a snake extending head and neck (can you speak of a snake's neck: if so, where does it end?) from beneath the rim of the toilet bowl in alarming proximity to my person and taking an interest in the surroundings. My reaction was instant. I was deprived of the African all-comers high jump record only by the low ceiling. The current state of my kit tended to hobble rather than enable any attempt at a speedy withdrawal but I got away as quick as I could. It was not an orderly retreat. With Carter and Reagan forgotten and Voice of America left to prattle away to itself, I left the scene to contemplate the battlefield from safe and neutral ground. There, I bravely concluded that I should do nothing. Next morning I put the problem to my cook and housekeeper, a man of resource and loyalty. He said he had seen such before and would deal with it. With the efficiency that was his mark, and without asking the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Snakes about permitted methods, he persuaded the reptile to leave its temporary lair and, shortly afterwards, its temporary hold on life. He emerged from the amenity like Moses holding carefully a serpent on a stick, in this case not a bronze image but, the real, recently living, creature. My man's name was not Moses but, no less Biblical, Abraham Adamu.

Even if the story of St Patrick ridding Ireland of snakes is a tall tale we bona fide members, Abraham Adam Moses and me, would warmly welcome him as an honorary member of our fairly exclusive company. **J.L.**
